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
Dear Sponsors and Supporters,

We always come away from our meetings with renewed excitement in our hearts when he tells us how God is blessing the school. He gave us a great report from his Jan/Feb Sakila trip. The results of the children's 4th grade testing were excellent! *All* of them did quite well. The lowest grade was a "C," and there were very few of those. We're waiting for the public schools to get the results of their testing so we can see how our children compare. Now keep in mind, that unlike the schools here in the states, children are not moved to the next grade level until they are able to master the material of their current grade. So, your child may be at a lower grade level than you'd expect. Many of the children just do not have the support at home to help them with their studies. Remember, we take children from some of the poorest families.

Miriam Peterson Lyimo is in 5th grade. Her mom and dad are both Christians and are extremely happy that Miriam is getting her education at Sluys-Anderson. Miriam has three brothers and two sisters. Her fourth brother just died from a tractor accident last month. Miriam is a good student who is always eager and ready to learn. She did very well on her national 4th grade exam (which allowed her to continue on to 5th grade).

I spoke with her, her main concern and worry was their house. She said that when her brother died she was very embarrassed that people were coming to her house and they'd see how they lived. "Our house is falling apart and my parents are not able to build a new one. At school we learn a lot about God. I just keep praying that one day I'll be able to make enough money to build them a nice new house. I keep telling my parents to pray for me so that I'll be successful and able to make enough money to do that for them and my younger brothers and sisters. I would just like to thank my sponsor for everything they are doing for me. I have uniforms, shoes, books, food and a very good school. God bless you very much."



Sluys-Anderson primary school is making a real difference in so many people's lives. As I visit many homes to see the conditions of these families, most of them do not have much, but they are very appreciative of the fact that their children are getting free education. Lord bless you for all the wonderful things you are doing for the people of this community.
